Donors Conference Offers 4-H Update

Representatives from the private sector received an update on 4-H at the 1985 4-H Donors Conference, October 1 and 2 at The Chicago Hilton. The conference featured a panel discussion on New Dimensions in 4-H: the Michigan Computer Project; "Blue Sky Below My Feet," a television series on space technology currently underway; Agricultural Career Awareness Project; and Nationwide 4-H Volunteer Leadership Development.

Cheryl Ringel, national 4-H ambassador from Wisconsin, brought greetings on behalf of 4-H members. Stressing the important life skills and values acquired through 4-H experiences, she said, "4-H'ers must learn to overlook the differences that separate them from others and concentrate on communicating with, getting along with and working with all kinds of people."

Dr. Donald L. Stormer, deputy administrator, 4-H/Youth, Extension service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, speaking on "Looking Ahead with 4-H," stressed the challenges facing the 4-H program today and tomorrow. "A challenge for 4-H is to continue to develop the public and private

This inspirational message reached 176 4-H youth and adult advisors, representing 44 states and Puerto Rico, who attended "Profiles for Tomorrow," October 12-15 at the National 4-H Center. The four-day training program for teen leaders, made possible by a grant from the *Monsanto Fund*, St. Louis, Missouri, was the first of five annual intensive training sessions for teens serving in leadership roles in their state 4-H programs.

Seminars and workshops focused on strengthening leadership styles, group dynamics, decision-making and communication skills, goal setting and increasing 4-H visibility. One participant, Jennifer Straub, 17, of Little Rock, Arkansas, said "talking with people from different states has given me ideas for programs to start back home in my own state. The workshops have taught me new techniques for teaching and organizing workshops that I never even thought of before." Straub says she wants to pursue a career in biochemistry and dedicate her life to doing cancer research.

"4-H has given me the motivation to do research in cancer areas and the opportunity to share what I've learned with others," she said. "4-H is a learning opportunity that can't be matched. You learn how to apply knowledge to everyday life—you learn about yourself and others."

Helen Thomas, White House bureau chief for *United Press International*, keynoted the general assembly on Sunday. Thomas told her audience to be proud of our democratic society where we are free to express our opinion and excel to be what we want to be. She encouraged young people to pursue a career in public service, continued on page 4

U.S. Trade Rep says "4-H Made The Difference"

A recent article in the Chicago Tribune featured U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter who attributes his success to his 4-H experiences while growing up on a farm in Nebraska.

'It was 4-H club work that made the difference," he said. "Until I started showing beef cattle, I had no exposure outside of an area of 10 to 12 miles. That was about it. It was 4-H competition in county and statewide competition that made me realize the broader world."

In the article, Yeutter tells his "rags-toriches life story"-how a poor farm boy became President Reagan's trade representative. He says there were rough days on the farm during the Great Depression but credits those times with teaching him about hard work. "You talk about work ethic! That was clearly the starting point in the establishment of my work habits."

Despite the fact that his father tried to discourage him from going to college because he needed help on the farm, Yeutter says a Dawson County agent, Harold Stevens, and a University of Nebraska professor who had judged Yeutter's livestock in several 4-H shows, influenced him to go to the university where he graduated first in his class in the agriculture college.

Yeutter then earned his doctor's degree in both agricultural economics and law. From there he went on to teach agriculture at the University of Nebraska and soon after entered into politics. He held a number of high ranking positions under the Nixon and Ford administrations.

Today, Yeutter is faced with one of America's most complicated challenges, improving America's trade position, but he still recalls when he won that trip to Chicago for National 4-H Congress. "I'll never forget it. I still feel the nostalgia when I walk into the Hilton Hotel."

trust and partnership," he said. "Open communication and full partnership with the people is necessary at all stages of 4-H program development. Both public and private resources are of concern to our partners in the enterprise we know as 4-H." Larry L. Krug, director, Communications, National 4-H Council, discussed 4-H visibility and the alumni search projects underway at Council.

The Wednesday morning session featured a presentation by former 4-H member Judy Price, vice president, Children's Programs, CBS Entertainment. Price said the biggest problem with children and TV is that they watch too much—an average of 40 hours per week. She also noted that CBS is incorporating major issues such as the hazards of drinking and driving and teenage suicide-two areas 4-H is also addressing-into afterschool programming.

At a banquet Tuesday evening, new donors and donors who have expanded their contributions into new program areas during this past year were recognized by Grant A. Shrum, president, National 4-H Council.

4-H'ers Finalists in 'TEEN Contest

Traci Griffis, a 4-H'er in Odum, Georgia, was one of five finalists in this year's All-American Girl Contest, co-sponsored by 'TEEN Magazine and Noxzema Skin Cream. The contest focuses national attention on outstanding teen achievers ages 13 through 18.

Traci was diagnosed as having diabetes at age five. In 1983, under the direction of her 4-H agent, Traci conducted a project on diabetes and entered it in the national 4-H competition. She organized a 15-minute lecture which explained diabetes and how to treat it. With this project, she won the national competition and was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship through Kraft, Inc., sponsor of the 4-H health awards program. Since, she has developed exhibits and demonstrations on a variety of healthrelated topics, such as hypertension, heart disease and nutrition. She is the 1984 International Grant Award Winner of the Diabetes In The News Community Service Award and the 1985 Georgia representative to the American Diabetes Youth Leadership Conference. She also won the Georgia Academy of Family Physicians Youth Scholarship Award. Currently, she is working to establish a chapter of the American Diabetes Association in her hometown.

Also featured in the September issue of 'TEEN were three 4-H'ers selected as finalists in the 'TEEN's Great Model Search: Amy Bewick, 15, Payette, Idaho; Angela Brown, 16, Glenview, Illinois; and

Kelly Sheppard, 14, Leicester, North Carolina. The winner of the contest will receive national recognition as a 'TEEN cover girl and a \$5,000 modeling contract with the Gillette Company.

She has been called "the mother of 4-H" and "the guardian angel of 4-H." These endearing terms capture the tremendous contribution Gertrude L. Warren made to the 4-H program. One of the pioneers of the 4-H movement, she began her service to 4-H in 1911 when she was brought to Washington, D.C. to give leadership to this program. Over the years, she was responsible for many accomplishments of the 4-H program, which grew from 330,000 members when she took charge of the organization, to nearly 4.5 million members today-making it the largest outof-school education program for youth in the nation.

In 1979, the Gertrude Warren Memorial Scholarship Fund was established and augmented by a gift from her sister, Mary Margaret Warren.

Recently, through the estate of Mary Margaret Warren, an additional contribution of nearly \$50,000 was made to the fund. These funds represent an everlasting commitment on the part of the Warren

family to continue fostering the education and growth of young people. Through their support, a number of educational scholarships will be provided to outstanding 4-H'ers.

Miss Warren encouraged the development of 4-H-type programs in many coun-

tries around the world and was instrumental in the establishment of the National 4-H Foundation (now the National 4-H Council) and the National 4-H Center outside of Washington, D.C. which annually serves as a training site for 35,000 youth and adults. A building at the 4-H Center is named in her honor.

In addition, she was active in many professional and service organizations. After her retirement in 1952, Miss Warren served as president of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association for several years and was named an Honorary National President of this organization. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and of the Washington Club in Washington, D.C.

CBS Spotlights Gertrude L. Warren

Gertrude L. Warren, "the mother of 4-H," was honored on the CBS "American Portrait" series, broadcast in most areas of the country on October 8, during National 4-H Week. The presentation of significant people in history appears regularly on CBS at the end of the 8:00 p.m. prime time programming. The brief presentation also featured the current 4-H program.

Resource Development Workshop Held

More than 40 state 4-H leaders, executive directors of state 4-H foundations, program leaders from the 4-H/Extension Service, USDA, and staff of National 4-H Council participated in the 1985 4-H Resource Development Workshop. The workshop was part of the 4-H and Youth Development Forum preceeding the annual meeting of the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents, October 31 -November 3, at the Hyatt Regency in Fort Worth, Texas. Sessions were devoted to planning and managing a major campaign, securing and maintaining an effective board and instituting a planned gifts program. Michael Radock, advisor to the president, Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, Flint, Michigan, and John Coy, president, John Deere Foundation, Moline, Illinois, were special guest speakers on "Accountability: Donor Expectations.'

As part of the Agricultural Hall of Fame's plans for a 25th anniversary celebration in 1986, 4-H'ers are being invited to submit names of persons connected with agriculture who will have their faces preserved forever in a major bronze mural to be housed in a special pavilion on the Hall of Fame grounds in Bonner Springs, Kansas. The youngsters must submit names along with a 100-word essay on why they think this person deserves to be honored. According to Lewis Watkins, the nationally known artist and sculptor doing the bronze casting, this will be the largest pouring of bronze in the United States in the past several years. Music composer Robert Moffa is also preparing a major four-part suite on the American Farmer for the celebration.

Following the official announcement of this project in Secretary of Agriculture John Block's office in September, the participants visited the National 4-H Center to explain their project. Harold Adkins, director of the Hall of Fame, and a 4-H alumnus, says donations of no more than \$1 are being solicited to help with the dedication ceremonies on June 14, 1986. Program Support Opportunities with The Campaign for 4-H

In 1983, the Board of Trustees of National 4-H Council launched The Campaign for 4-H to raise \$50.6 million for strengthening and expanding 4-H programs. The Campaign provides opportunities for support in a wide variety of program areas including the development of new and expanded 4-H programs. The following proposals identify just a few of the priorities for which private support is being sought:

Nearly 270,000 boys and girls are participating in the National 4-H Fashion Revue Awards Program, learning selfconfidence and poise, and how to plan, select and construct clothing and accessories expressive of individual personality. The program stresses the value of creativity, good posture and grooming habits through fashion modeling. Although partially funded by Simplicity Pattern Co. Inc. and White/Elna Sewing Machine Co., additional support is sought.

The idea of a 4-H Bicentennial Constitution Program was sparked by the 200th anniversary of the United States Constitution and the growing interest among youth to examine the origins of our Constitution and its impact on our lives today. Gifts to The Campaign for 4-H are sought to implement a 4-H Constitution Bicentennial Program in 1986 and 1987 which will provide teenage 4-H members with an opportunity to apply for training and to develop and implement local Constitution study projects.

The National 4-H Center serves as a focal point for innovative leadership and citizenship training programs for 4-H members, leaders and staff. Funds are needed for replacement of one building at the National 4-H Center and for several important conference and training facilities: teleconferencing center, a computer lab, media production and demonstration studios, and a physical fitness facility.

The National 4-H Dairy Awards Program provides a remarkable opportunity for 4-H members to explore careers in the dairy industry and to learn about the significant role it plays in our nation's economy and the world market. Currently, more than 85,000 4-H members are involved in the dairy program. Sponsorship of a full awards program for participants is sought. CIGNA and Cooperating Insurance Agencies are providing partial support.

International Conference A Success

Nearly 200 young people and professional youth workers from North America, Latin America, the Caribbean and Spain participated in the XI InterAmerican-Ibero Rural Youth Conference at the National 4-H Center, October 5-12. Since 1964, these conferences have provided training for professional rural youth workers, and supported participation by rural youth in the development of their country's resources. Delegates came from Argentina, Barbados, Belize, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Guyana, Haiti, Honduras, Jamaica, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, St. Lucia, Spain, Suriname, Uruguay and Venezuela.

Topics addressed at the conference included technology to improve and increase agricultural skills, career opportunities, improving the quality of family life, and increased cultural understanding. These sessions were conducted in both English and

The official opening of the conference took place at the U.S. Department of Agriculture on Saturday. Participants also attended a reception and dinner at the National Press Club on October 10. Postconference activities included home visits by foreign youth and adults with rural 4-H families in the Washington, D.C. area.

The conference was under the direction of the 4-H Youth Program, Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Ibero-American Rural Youth Advisory Council. Additional funding for the conference was provided by Extension Service and other agencies in USDA, friends of National 4-H Council and the W.K. Kellogg Foundation with a grant to provide scholarships for delegates from 24 Latin American and Caribbean countries.

"Wall Street Journal" Features 4-H

"4-H in the South Bronx: Where Are the Cows?" was the title of a feature story in a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal. The article focused on "The A Team 4-H Club" located in the South Bronx section of New

The story revealed the significant role 4-H is playing as a recreational and educational program for city youth.

Explaining the similarities and differences between a rural 4-H program and an urban one, Carolyn Smith, New York City 4-H agent, says that while large animal projects aren't possible in the city, the focus is on other project areas such as gardening and nutrition.

It is estimated that there are more than 30,000 boys and girls involved in 4-H clubs, special interest groups, and school enrichment programs in New York City. Deborah Boyce, 4-H leader, says, "4-H is giving kids an option to being punk or streetwise and has added to the quality of life here. 4-H has made the kids accountable to each other for their behavior."

Forestry Invitational Tests Skills

Nearly 100 4-H members, volunteer leaders and Extension staff participated in the sixth annual National 4-H Forestry Invitational at Jackson's Mill State 4-H Camp, Weston, West Virginia, July 29-August 1. The competitive event, sponsored by International Paper Company Foundation, which also sponsors the national 4-H forestry awards, was attended by delegates and observers from 16 states. These young people competed for honors in tree identification and measurement. forest evaluation, insect and disease identification and compass orienteering. In a "forestry bowl," they demonstrated their knowledge of forestry and conservation practices. 
