

Kenneth H. Anderson

In September of this year, Kenneth H. Anderson began his 36th year with the National 4-H Service Committee—a long-time record of distinguished service that stands alone in the history of 4-H at the national level.

First as Service Director, and then as Associate Director of the Committee, he has seen 4-H membership increase five-fold. He has watched the program reach out to young people throughout this nation and in 82 other countries. And he has seen the successful merger of public and private support that makes 4-H truly unique.

But it would be wrong to suggest that Ken has simply observed all this. On the contrary, he has been part of it—a changemaker in the truest sense.

Ken attended his first National 4-H Congress as a South Dakota crops winner in 1928. Six years later, he graduated from South Dakota State with a degree in agriculture. He worked with the 4-H staff there until 1937 when he received one of the first National 4-H Fellowships ever awarded.

The other recipient was Winifred Perry, a Vermonter later to become Mrs. Ken Anderson. The Andersons have three daughters.

A friend recently commented that it is a rare thing to see a man well into his third decade on the job, still a creative force in 4-H, still an acknowledged leader, still very much a part of what is new in the program.

A number of other people agreed with that assessment. They met last spring to determine whether Ken might be especially recognized now for his singular part in the greening of 4-H.

They were not thinking of a retirement salute, because that is several years away. They wanted the appreciation to be more contemporary and to begin with the 1974 National 4-H Congress when the first Ken Anderson educational scholarship will be presented to a 4-H citizenship winner.

This is especially appropriate for a man who has already been personally responsible for recruiting the funds to provide more than 6,500 4-H scholarships.

In addition, the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C. soon will include the Kenneth H. Anderson National 4-H Reference Gallery.

The gallery is already planned for the soon-to-be constructed J. C. Penney Hall. It will provide space for a reading-reference area, an art collection and a series of permanent 4-H exhibits.

In the meantime, the members of the Kenneth H. Anderson 4-H Appreciation Committee acknowledge the business leaders, Extension workers and countless friends who wanted to say thanks to Ken by giving something especially lasting to 4-H.






FUNCTION ROOMS AT THE CONRAD HILTON
