







Introduction

THROUGHOUT THE WORLD there is growing interest in the food crisis—producing enough food for our increasing population. Slowly there is a recognition that young people have a role in solving this problem.

This is one of the many changes taking place in our world which make it necessary for young people to become better trained than ever before. And, from country to country, 4-H members have found that through their rural youth club programs they have a common bond bringing them closer together with others pursuing a better way of life under the green and white clover banner.

The spirit of 4-H, of "Learn by Doing," is indicated by this symbol and others patterned from it. 4-H is one of the most significant contributions the people of the United States have made to the world.

This book includes 4-H and related or similar rural youth programs of the world. It does not cover rural scouting, future farmers groups, and other fine programs that are making important contributions to training youth in Canada, Ghana, Mexico, Nigeria, Peru, Poland and the United States, to specify a few countries. The basic criteria for selections in this book has been an educational rural youth program's kinship to 4-H and/or its adoption of the basic principles of 4-H.

Usually the relationship to U. S. 4-H is quite direct. Nearly all of these programs share a common appreciation for the worth of the individual boy and girl. Political organizations are not included since they are primarily constituted to further political ends rather than rural youth education.

About 85 percent of the data in this book has been furnished in 1966. The statistics are furnished, in most part, by the leaders of the programs or by other persons closely associated with them. This "on-the-scene" reporting insures the highest degree of accuracy possible.

Conditions are not always conducive to the growth of rural youth programs. In the past three years programs have been discontinued in Honduras, British Honduras, Pakistan, Lebanon, Laos, Tanzania and Jordan. More than a dozen new programs are reported. There are indications that Cyprus and Yemen may soon establish rural youth clubs.

It is difficult to compare the programs or the statistics of one continent with another. Each program is adapted to the culture, traditions and needs of the youth of that land.

This book is a guide to the world of 4-H; it is an introduction, not a complete study. It should serve to plant the seeds of interest, but further study of the other peoples of the world will be needed to bring them to flower. Better understanding is a goal of 4-H international programs, thus, an objective of this book.—TH.

RURAL YOUTH EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS





— An International Symbol of Rural Youth Programs

No one knows exactly how or where 4-H came about. It is recognized that several people—mostly rural school teachers—in widely scattered areas of the United States began at the turn of the century by teaching rural boys and girls using some new and unorthodox methods. The industrial revolution had made many changes in the United States and these teachers recognized a need for better training, more practical training than youngsters were receiving in their rural schools. The great agricultural research and teaching facilities created by the Morrill Land-Grant Act of 1862 were acquiring deserved reputations for their work. However, most of the improved methods devised at the universities were not known by the average American farmer.

Boys and Girls Agricultural Clubs, Girls Home Culture Clubs, Boys Corn Clubs, Girls Tomato Clubs and other forerunners of 4-H came into being. As these clubs grew in popularity and effectiveness, they became associated with the agricultural colleges of the State Land-Grant Universities. By teaching many of the new agricultural and homemaking methods to the boys and girls, their parents and other adults were made aware of the practical application of these ideas. This was an important factor in the great technological

revolution that was to make American farmers the most productive in the world.

The principles of 4-H, as stated in the U. S. over 60 years ago, are found in dozens of similar rural youth educational programs of the world. The "Learn by Doing" concept is unique, as is the responsibility accepted by voluntary local leaders. So is the idea of the member's ownership of his project, and the manner in which members learn democratic procedures by conducting their club's affairs. So many programs have symbolized these concepts by the green four-leaf clover that it has become the international symbol of rural youth educational programs.

In the beginning, there was no 4-H name or symbol. First came a three-leaf clover with an H in each leaf denoting head, hands and heart. These H's were used in Iowa as early as 1908, and probably came from a speech some years before by the President of Iowa State College. The fourth H, for health, was added later.

But how did the clover become associated with boys and girls clubs, rather than some other flower or plant? This seems to have come about because of a bouquet of clovers a group of rural school children presented to their visiting superintendent, O. H. Benson of Wright County, Iowa. He was inspired by their presentation, and from it gained the symbol he had been seeking for the new clubs. The clover represented good fortune. Miss Gertrude Warren was later to note that the green of the clover was "Nature's most common color in the great out-of-doors and is also emblematic of youth, life and growth." The background of white symbolizes the purity of youth.

The clover with the H's was officially adopted as the symbol of Boys and Girls Club Work by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1911. Yet this was still the symbol, not the name. That change did not come until the early 1920's when the emblem had achieved popularity and when many felt the formal name was too cumbersome. While the name 4-H was always unique, there were those who disliked having to explain what it meant. Others recognized these situations as opportunities for telling the 4-H story.

There are over 250 varieties of clovers in the world, native to every continent except Australia. This has made the symbol easy to identify with the rural youth programs of other lands. There are at least 47 programs using the clover as part of their symbol—all but two use the four-leaf clover. Three other countries have adapted the idea to their native flowers or trees, i.e., the five petals of the mahogony flower (the national flower of the Dominican Republic) are emblematic of 5-D Clubs; Liberia has placed the 4-H's in the trunk of a palm tree; and Sudan has replaced the clover with a cotton leaf.

The programs more closely patterned from 4-H in the U. S. have tended to adopt the emblem as well, but usually adding some national identity. The clover is an outward symbol of a tie to successful rural youth programs the world over.

In developing countries, the four-leaf clover emblems are representing programs with much the same purpose as the original 4-H Clubs more than a half century ago:

-Increasing agricultural production, and the health and living standards

of the rural people.

—Training young people to improve themselves and the living conditions for their families, their communities and their countries.



A discussion of rural youth program symbols would not be complete without a reference to the world globe with accenting clouds and IFYE initials of the International Farm Youth Exchange. IFYE began in 1948 as the first personto-person 4-H exchange program. Since that time nearly 4,000 young men and women from the U. S. and 69 other

countries have participated. Like 4-H itself, it was initiated by the young people of the U. S., but it continues to grow in size and effectiveness because of the interest and support of cooperating programs throughout the world. Many other rural youth exchanges have been patterned from IFYE.

The IFYE symbol was adopted in 1951, although the name was in use from the very beginning, three years earlier. The green and white colors give an international dimension to the purity and the growth of 4-H. IFYE participants have done much to foster 4-H-type groups in many countries. The program has also been an important international experience for the host families, 4-H Clubs and communities where IFYE's have visited. And, like 4-H, IFYE has been a valuable training experience for young people.

IFYE's success led to the inauguration in 1965 of the 4-H Member International Exchange to give young people in 4-H (ages 17-20) a short-term foreign living experience. The first exchanges have been with Europe.

Both programs are conducted by the National 4-H Club Foundation in behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land-Grant Universities and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. By exercising this aspect of its international education responsibilities through a private institution the Extension Service has again pioneered new frontiers.




